■ Jim Mellor from London suffered so badly from circulatory problems he was told his leg would have to be amputated. As a last gasp effort he decided to visit Danny. "After three visits I was walking for up to three hours," he said. "Prior to that I was lucky if I could walk 20 yards. I am now back playing golf! Last week I was running around Wembley! I know that but for Danny Gallagher I would not be able to leave my wheelchair."

■ Brigid Murphy of Ennis-corthy was in the terminal stages of bowel cancer, weighed only four stone, and was expected to live only a matter of weeks. After visiting Danny she steadily improved and two months later was able to attend a wedding.

■ James Craig is a retired construction worker from New York who suffered from arthritis and could barely walk. "I made an appointment to see Danny," he said. "He lit a candle, took a crucifix and rubbed it on my feet, then up and down my legs. I'm much better now. I thank God, and I thank Danny."

■ A Mississauga (US) man had his sight restored by Danny. "I suffered from diabetes and my eyesight got gradually worse," he said. "I got glasses, but my sight deteriorated until I was virtually blind. Then I visited Danny three times, and I was

cured almost overnight."

■ Chris Tarrant, the TV and radio personality, witnessed Danny curing a woman of arthritis. The woman's recovery, which transformed her from a crawling invalid to someone who could walk normally, was recorded as part of a television show.

■ Not everyone is cured by Danny — something he readily admits. Wheelchair-bound news reporter Chris O'Donoghue filed a story about Danny for Channel 19 (New York). The Derry man prayed over the reporter but, regrettably, O'Donoghue still works from his wheelchair.

Scale of charges

THE charges for treatment from the different disciplines vary but some are free.

■ Danny Gallagher: fee, by donation; private consultation, £15.00.

■ General practitioner: (in Britain/NI): free; G.P. (Republic): £20.

■ Psychotherapist (National Health): free.

■ Therapist (private): from £25 per hour upwards.

■ Osteopath or chiropractor: (London): minimum £25, rising to £30 or more.

■ Harley Street specialist: consultation minimum £50; follow-up by arrangement.

■ Priest/minister: free; donation to church funds welcome.
